# Minister's letter

It's happened hasn't it? In fact, it started to happen in mid-October - Christmas adverts on the TV! And with them the gravitational pull of Christmas seems to begin in earnest. As we begin gearing up for Christmas can we keep enough of a focus on Jesus and his birth and the unparalleled significance of this event? There is always much to divert our attention from this which is highly ironic given the point of Christmas. I want to keep very much in mind this Christmas a portrait of Jesus, and to work this up into something with perhaps more realism and credibility than has been the case up to now. What do I mean by is? I've been struck by a new book by one of my favourite authors, John Eldredge, which is called "Beautiful Outlaw: Experiencing the Playful, Disruptive, and Extravagant Personality of Jesus." Eldredge makes the point that despite the incredible visual age we live in, we too readily accept a two dimensional portrait of Jesus in which he's depicted, as a man, as a pale, wispy, almost haunted figure who floats through life. And then, at Christmas, on cards and in nativity scenes he's portrayed as a rather mature baby, very white and radiantly clean, intelligent, without need and already able to reassure adults around him. The reality of the context Jesus was born into, which involved genocide with Jesus and his family being hunted, indeed throughout his life Jesus was hunted and frequently on the run, is overlooked. We've cleaned it all up. This is understandable on the one hand, but if we are to really get to know Jesus we need to appreciate the reality of the life Jesus lived here on earth, with it's pressures and challenges and, that whilst he was hunted, he was also the hunter.

Eldredge's main argument is that in sanitising and stereotyping Jesus we actually lose sight of his personality. Perhaps not his acts of humility, faith and compassion, but there is so much more to Jesus and his personality that we can glean - his playfulness, his cunning, his wit, his brilliance, his irreverence, the way he lived so freely, his exasperation, his impatience. If we can learn to look at Jesus in a much more rounded and human way I believe we'll find ourselves growing as disciples because we'll be in a better position to imitate Jesus in our own daily lives. Eldredge talks of the power of the religious fog that settles and so blinds us to a full 3D portrait of Jesus. I love this quote from Eldredge - "Good grief - your hamster seems to have a more fully developed personality than most portraits of Jesus.....what is missing in our Gospel reading - and in our attempts to 'read' what Jesus is saying and doing in our lives right now, this week - is his *personality*, undraped by religion."

So that's my challenge, not just for Christmas but all the time. I'm thinking we need to weave into our preaching at Trinity a good look into the personality of Jesus. It seems pretty important.

Drawing back from Christmas there are a number of matters closer to hand to mention here. We have the Community Fayre on 12th of this month. A massive

thanks to Jane and everyone helping with this. Please do pop leaflets through neighbour's and friend's letter boxes, and extend a personal invitation where you can. The Marriage Course continues and, whilst small as a pilot exercise, it is going well. I'm so pleased that the Church Meeting last month so positively endorsed Suz Powell's placement as a trainee youth worker. I feel her presence in this role is already having a very positive impact. I'm encouraged too by the positive response to the introduction of the Tools for the Job series on the Gifts of the Spirit. The plan is to record all the sermons and have them available on the website, or, I guess as email attachments. I hope that we'll record the majority of our sermons and other talks and presentations from now on. As I write we are just organising how to best manage all this. There are lots of other things going on too, the majority of which clearly come under the Vision banner. I'm conscious of the need to really do better at promoting the vision activities so that as many of us as possible realise what is what and can get involved and behind whatever we feel God is drawing us towards. If you have ideas for how to publicise and profile the vision work then please do get in touch.

Other activities on my mind at the moment are the Olympics and how, through having some local Olympic themed events, we might be able to help build "community" in and round the District Centre by partnering not only with other local churches but with other stakeholders such as ASDA and the Leisure Centre, the Halifax and so on. There are some exciting opportunities here and initial meetings have been encouraging. I'd value your prayers with this as it is potentially a significant and full agenda but one that could have a very positive legacy. Doors may be opening as well for some chaplaincy work in ASDA so please pray for this too.

One of the key values of our vision process was to do a few things and to do them well! We do need to bear this in mind! That said, one further activity to flag up, which brings me back to Christmas again, is the intention to host a Christmas lunch at Trinity on Christmas Day for anyone in the area who is lonely. If you're interested in helping to organise this then please can you contact Ann Baker. Many thanks.

I'm off to the hospital now to see a consultant about my arthritic hip and then I've got a few days off as its half term. Can't believe that we're now into November. How quickly have the last two months gone by?! Yikes! In two months' time Christmas will have happened!

## *Festival of Christmas Trees*



Last year's Festival of Christmas trees was a new initiative which gave an opportunity to open Trinity Church to the wider public by inviting them to come and see Christmas trees decorated by different local community groups, businesses, schools, pub, library etc. At the same time the project was used to raise money for Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital.

Many people who visited the Church were greatly impressed by the ingenuity, time and effort which had gone into decorating the Christmas trees, and thought it a pity that the trees were taken down after just two days.

Consequently this year the Christmas trees at will remain in the Church for two weekends and the intervening week. The first day of the Festival is Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> December, when the Town Mayor, Tim Chambers, will open the Festival when about 40 decorated Christmas trees will be on display.

During the week of the festival there will be other supporting events happening. The **Christmas Entertainment Evening** is on the Saturday evening of the opening day, the **Trinity Concert Band** will be playing in the Church on Tuesday 6<sup>th</sup> December, and on Sunday, 11<sup>th</sup> December, there is the **Carol Service**. The Christmas trees will be taken down after the service.

All of the proceeds from the Festival of Christmas trees and other fund-raising events during the week are this going to support the charity **Help for Heroes**.

# TRINITY RECIPES FOR THE MICROWAVE

The latest of Sandy Catchick's microwave recipes:

## Scottish Shortbread

### Ingredients:

150 butter, softened in microwave

200g plain flour, sieved

70g caster sugar - plus a little extra for sprinkling over

35g semolina

### Method:

Line a round microwaveable cake mould e.g. a silicon cake mould with baking parchment. Separately, place all of the ingredients into a large mixing bowl and combine together until the mixture resembles coarse breadcrumbs. Knead into a soft dough. Put the dough into the cake mould and flatten. Pinch around the edges of the circle, mark into 10-12 segments and prick all over with a fork. Microwave for 5 - 7 minutes on a medium setting, or until the shortbread is dry to the touch on the top, and just set in the centre. Leave to cool slightly on the turntable. Remove carefully from the microwave, dust with caster sugar. Cool completely before removing from the tray and breaking sections into pieces.

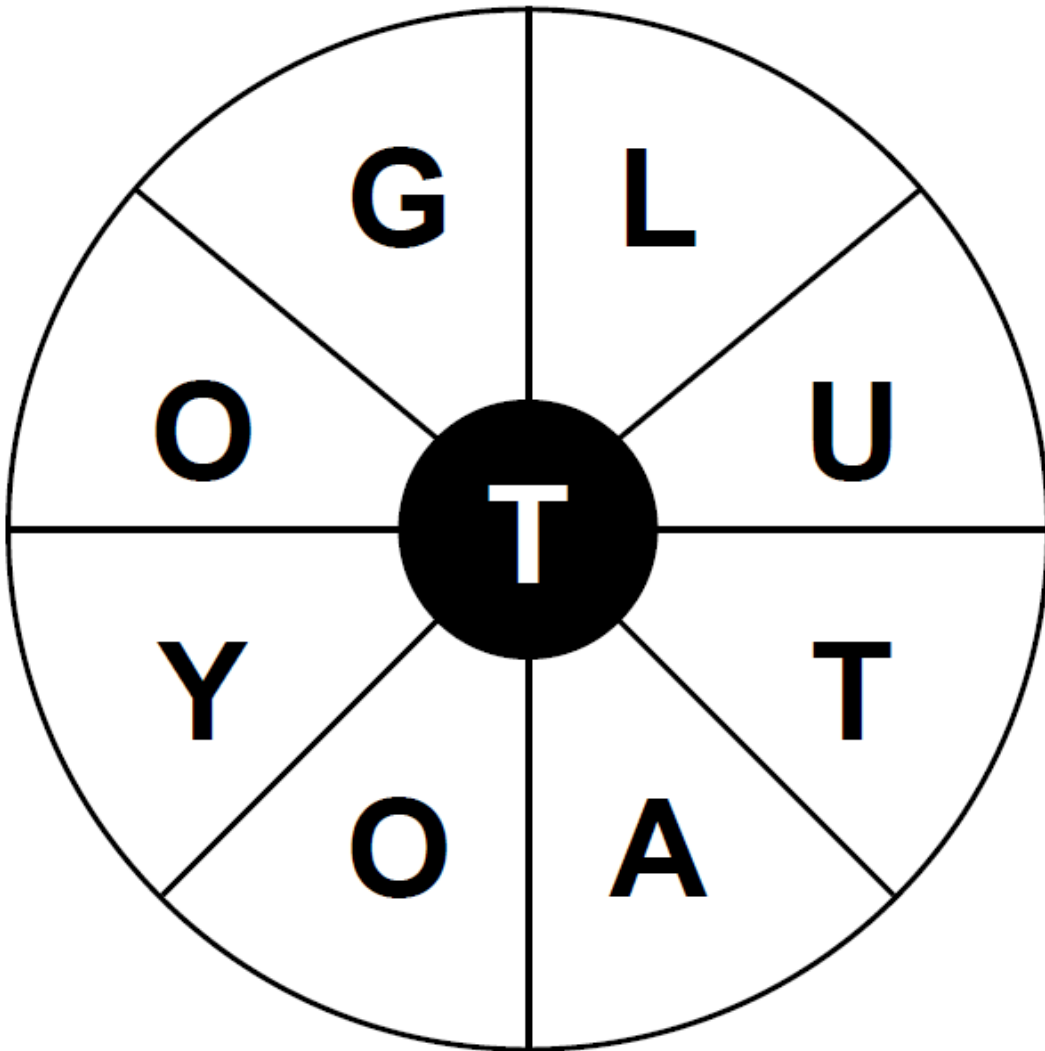

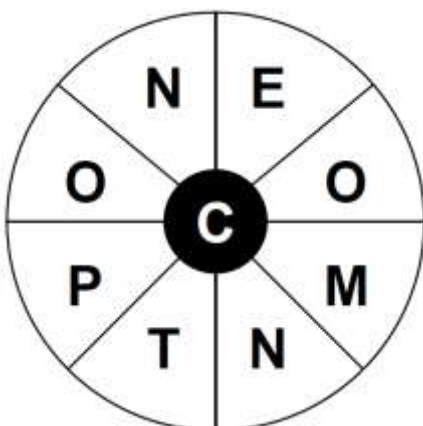
